I began my post as vicar of St Michael and All Angels in January 2002, so I have been here with my family for over thirteen years. It has been a very happy time, challenging of course but very fruitful. The church has changed significantly, whilst maintaining parts of the older traditions that still


feed people. It has been a wonderful place in which to live and minister but sadly we have decided that it is now time to move. I have now been appointed as Rector of Great Milton with Little Milton and Great Haseley near Oxford. My licensing (when the post officially starts) will be Monday October 19th. Some might be interested to know what will happens next here? Appointments for a new vicar will take some time and the process won't officially start until after I leave. A parish profile will be drawn up which has to have the agreement of the church here, the Deanery of High Wycombe (where I have also been Area Dean since Jan 2012) and the Archdeaconry of Buckingham, which is part of the Diocese of Oxford. The post will be advertised both locally and nationally in church papers and websites and prospective vicars will be invited to apply. Like any other role there will be a shortlist of candidates and a series of interviews and a visit to the parish here. Unlike many other roles a successor will not be sought or found until after I leave the post. This might seem strange and to many people frustrating but in practice it is an opportunity for a church and parish to allow for some space and pause and reflect what they will be looking for in a candidate.

The time has passed extraordinarily quickly since we moved in during a very foggy beginning of 2002. This is where my daughters have grown up and where we have made very close friendships. However there is also a natural cycle to things. For the Church and parish I believe that it is time for someone else to new perspective and vision, and for me, in my mid 50's I would hope that I still have another ministry in me yet! I move to smaller villages and churches, more rural in their character than here with all the challenges and opportunities that will bring. Cath and I will miss living in Hughenden Valley tremendously; it has been a real privilege to be here. However, we are also looking forward to new opportunities and challenges over the border in Oxfordshire, which does have a bit of a prior claim on me as it is the county where I moved to at the age of seven.

<u>Hughenden Valley Sports Committee</u> Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA)

This is the sequence of events, in bulleted form, documenting the progress that the Sports Committee has made in its mission to provide a MUGA, a floodlit Astro Pitch, suitable for 2 x Tennis courts. It is also suitable for 5-a-side Football, Football training in all weathers, Netball, Basketball, etc. This will be sited at the far end of the football pitch where the two floodlights are.

- This began as an initiative on the Hughenden Valley Residents Association agenda - "More sport facilities needed in Hughenden Valley". A questionnaire returned positive results. Magnolia Park proved unsuccessful, except for our football matches and practices. Bowls; not enough (100) people wanted it yet, so temporarily it will be on the back burner.
- Refocus on King George V Field, in walking distance. HVFC use it in the winter, (plus the Parish field), but it is mostly empty in summer. Ladies, families and girls need more sport opportunity. A MUGA was thought to be appropriate and for the men and boys!
- The Volunteer Sports Committee gelled and included sport enthusiasts from various different parts of the community; HVRA, Village Hall Committee, HVFC and Councillor Simon Kearey. Their interests represent tennis, hockey, netball and football (including 5-a-side) and cricket, most having participated, led or still organise these sports.
- Sam Flatman of Pentagon in Bristol advised on MUGA playing surfaces, costs, maintenance and fencing, and he brought samples to see and handle.
- Sarah Randell of Wycombe Sports Development came and confirmed Sam Flatman's order of procedure up to planning permission. The site chosen for the MUGA at the far end of the football pitch was measured, perfectly sufficient for two tennis courts, netball or 5-a-side football area with enough surrounding space.
- The HVFC would love a MUGA, likewise the Hughenden Primary School and the Sports Committee.
- The idea of a cricket match in July, fitted the scheme.
- Sarah Randell recommended we inspect Marlow Sports Club's MUGA, from which we returned with very complimentary and useful observations.
 TigerTurf were advertising there and will be contacted.

- As Marlow gets waterlogged in winter (like here) they use a sand-based MUGA with an international quality playing-surface, with yearly maintenance costed in. It is brushed periodically. Water-based MUGA sometimes ice-up.
- Michael Sole, Dylan Jones and Matt Hopkins are looking at all the legal documents referring to King George V Field Charity status and covenants and ongoing management.
- A tabulation of estimated time scales is being formatted.
- John Dockett has distributed useful information from Graham Sweet of Marlow Sports Club's success.
- The MUGA will have a green see through fence and the playing surface will look like grass, even from quite close-up, and in the field it will be well away from houses. Maintenance will be relatively cheap and it should still look pristine after 5 years, and still good after fifteen years.
- Funding promises will need to be in writing.
- Sponsors will be needed. The more money we raise the more we gain funding from, for instance, Sport England.
- After a formal survey, tenders, (a minimum of three), will be put out for costing, and then planning can be officially applied for. However, no problems are anticipated.
- The stakeholders of the project include the Village Hall Trustees, HVRA, Hughenden Primary School, Hughenden Valley Football Club, Hughenden Ladies Running Club, The Shop, local business employees, tennis, netball et al.
- The MUGA will enable youngsters to play, practise passes and techniques and adults can revitalise and enjoy their chosen game. A booking system will operate if necessary.
- So far the Sports Committee comprises Janet and Angus Idle. John Dockett, Heather Dempsey, Rosemary Hewitt (all of the HVRA) Michael Sole, Dylan Jones, John Beveridge (Village Hall Committee), Neil Bellamy (HVFC), Cllr. Simon Kearey, and we know we have the approval of Matt Hopkins (Hopkins Estate), and hopefully everyone else.

STOP PRESS

Since writing the above report we have met the new owner of Uplands and his team, including his architect. His team described his plans for redevelopment of the site but stressed that plans so far reflect a genuine appreciation of the historic and special ecological aspects of Uplands and the knowledge that it is a sensitive site within the AONB and Green Belt area. This is very welcome. We were assured that the Grade II listed building and the large older building would both remain unaltered externally but inside them apartments will be constructed. The original Edward Cullinan design will remain. He himself will visit

They stressed that their plans will probably evolve further as they collect data and will have to meet AONB, Wycombe District Council and other official body regulations. They are meeting local representatives and we were pleased to have such an invaluable chance to meet both the team and the owner who all appear to have an aesthetic appreciation of this unique and sensitive site above Hughenden Valley. We feel we made valid points. The owner is definitely applying for change of use from Business to Residential but with experience of saving places like Uplands and with respect for local input. When plans have further evolved an exhibition will be presented in mid-September. We will keep you informed which is their wish.

In order to maintain the beauty of the Garden of Rest, the existing rules concerning appropriate grave furniture, plants etc. will be more appropriately enforced as from 1st September 2016. At present, vegetation such as conifer trees, have in some areas become overcrowded and difficult to maintain. They often encroach on neighbouring plots. There will be an opportunity to re-plant non-conforming plants elsewhere. Hughenden Parish Council takes enormous pride in maintaining the Garden of Rest to a very high standard. We understand how important it is for relatives to know that their loved ones graves are being treated with dignity and respect.

We hope that local residents will give serious consideration to this being their final resting place close to those that they love.
