

Thanks to the work of a few villagers, our contribution to the Parish Council Maps & Walks initiative is about to be handed over to the council. To produce our input, 2 walks were undertaken, one up into the Piggotts area and another to the south taking in the hall and church. Along the way we gathered information on flora, fauna and heritage. The exercise itself

introduced a number of like minded folk to each other and the walks not only produced content for the scheme but were very enjoyable too.

Special thanks must go to Mike Hill, Rob White and Steve Pickersgill who variously designed and led walks and contributed additional content. A final point on this, drawing all the content together, editing and getting into a printed form is a specialist task. Anyone interested in joining the team to do this please get in contact.

Our 'Planning for the Future' exercise continues to move forward. There is now acceptance within our Executive Committee that the Residents Association has to change to respond to changing times. What those changes should be still engenders heated debate. On the one hand some feel a more radical approach is required involving addressing the name of the association and making some structural changes to the way we are run.

Others feel that the structure is sound enough and is maybe just going through a difficult time attracting volunteers to serve on the committee and will return to 'business as usual' at some stage in the future.

What is not in doubt is that many of

the voluntary organisations operating in our village and in many other surrounding villages, are facing a challenging time in attracting volunteers. I referred to this in my Winter Roundup. Single interest groups like Photography, Arts, Drama, Church, Climate Change and Football seem to fare better than more general groups like HVRA, HAGA, Parish Council and the Village Hall which are all suffering similar problems.

If we value these groups then we need to support them and get involved. Or perhaps some groups become no longer relevant to what the community needs or wants. Maybe they can be allowed to just fade away.

Hedges, Pavements etc.

At the end of November 2023, the HVRA Secretary wrote to the Parish Council and our Buckinghamshire councillors documenting concerns about the poor state of the grass verges, hedges, pavements etc. in and around Hughenden Valley.

All HVRA Road Reps were asked to survey the state of affairs in their patch and this formed the basis of the Secretary's letter. This saved HPC and BC a lot of leg-work and means the HVRA can keep track of progress, or lack thereof.

Without doubt this is an area of potentially confused responsibilities. For example, property owners are responsible for keeping their hedges off pavements, HPC cut the grass and

should be keeping it off the pavements and responsibility for repairs to pavements is with BC.

The Parish Council update later in this issue outlines their plans for the coming year but does not address specific places.

Community Speed Watch

I thought I would share with you several screenshots of recent driving offences captured on the Sentinel Video Camera during the week commencing 8 January 2024 whilst carrying out sessions in Valley Road. The first photo shows a BMW travelling at 37mph being overtaken by a Vauxhall van at 44mph that continued past our camera at 45mph. It was then caught on the Mobile Vehicle Activated Sign (MVAS) opposite Deeters whizzing past at 44mph. The time was 3.15pm on Tuesday, 9th January.

At 9.43am the following day this black Mitsubishi was filmed travelling in the middle of the road at 42 mph on its approach to the Combe Lane round-about but there was no reason for doing so except, on closer inspection, it would appear that the driver was on his mobile phone! During the CSW session, according to Gov.uk records, 2 vehicles were un-taxed; 1 had expired on 1.4.23, and the other on 2.10.23 plus its MOT had run out on

that is now being carried out by Steve Pickersgill – Thank you, Steve.

It is not unusual for local residents to stop and ask what we are doing or thank us for doing a great job. This information is passed on to the Police or the DVLA to take further action.

Drainage Improvement Group

Shortly before I went on holiday in early February I wrote my usual piece for the magazine. In it I wrote that despite the wet weather over the last few months, the drains and sewers had coped well. Even with the stream starting to flow the levels in the sewers at the bottom end of the valley looked pretty much normal. I additionally wrote that we had been pushing the council via FixMyStreet to clear all road drains in the valley and to sweep the detritus at the roadsides – which didn't happen.

That article has since been scrapped and a complete rewrite taken place. Everything changed overnight on 17th





– 18th February, when a prolonged downpour upended our relatively peaceful life in the valley. Sadly for the Harrow and nearby residents, the area was flooded badly with road drains completely overwhelmed. The Harrow itself was flooded inside with a number of houses having their gardens awash and at least one house flooded with water we understand. Remarkably, the Harrow reopened almost immediately following a rapid cleanup operation.

Meanwhile, at the other end of the valley the overnight rain had put pressure on the sewer system





resulting in several instances of sewage escapes in householders gardens. Levels in inspection pits were very high and threatening spillages. Under these circumstances, we have to curtail use of downstairs loos and minimise water usage to try and not add to the problem.

The sewer junction in the field below the pumping station has also been gushing sewage into the field. Dog walkers are of course best advised to keep their dogs clear of the stream when this happens.

Thames Water have been drawn in and have been checking properties

but advise that the entire network is under severe pressure and there is little they can do at the moment. Residents have pushed to try and get some tankering from the system to help. We are also trying to ascertain whether overpumping units used in the valley at the last major flood are still available to install if the situation worsens.

The weather forecast isn't great as I write this, but any relief from rain will help ease the situation until a general improvement in the weather.


We also host meetings of the Residents Association every month as well as annual art and photography exhibitions.

On one occasion they dressed up as St Trinian's girls and rode on a 28-seater bike down the main road, Joan in a short gymslip, pigtails and with a very dirty face! The bike gave up the ghost halfway down the road and had to be abandoned!

Joan was a staunch member and supporter of the Mothers' Union, being a Facilitator for the MU Parenting Course, which gave new and prospective parents guidance on raising their children. Some years ago she was MU Leader and was responsible for the creation of the Mothers' Union Garden which, under her guidance, was transformed from a piece of overgrown land into the lovely garden it is today. She was an excellent cook and she and Hugh hosted many dinners at their house on Coombe Hill.

The day before she died, I met Joan outside my house in Boss Lane, walking with her carer, Caroline and her great friend, Barbara. Her wonderful smile on that occasion will always stay with me.

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News from St Michael's Church

We have had a number of works done to the Church in the last few months.

Most recently a defibrillator has been fitted alongside the hedge in the carpark, which we hope will be unnecessary, but provides a community resource accessible to park users and others. A defibrillator is, of course, a machine able to deliver a high energy shock to someone suffering a cardiac arrest.

The Resuscitation Council of the UK states: Public access defibrillators are designed to be used by the public. When you switch the defibrillator on, it will provide clear instructions and talk you through what you need to do.

A defibrillator will not harm the person suffering a cardiac arrest and will only give them a shock if and when it is needed. There's no

reason to feel nervous about using a defibrillator - just follow its simple instructions and know that using it could save someone's life.

We have also removed the step to the church and replaced it with a gentle paved ramp making wheelchair access easier, and generally making entry into the church safer. Once inside, new lighting provides brighter, easier to control and more eco-friendly illumination.





Other exciting news is that we are looking to appoint a full time Children and Families minister to support our work in the parish. Full details for interested parties on the Church website: www. hughendenpariushchurch.org.uk.

Although it seems we have only recently taken down the Christmas decorations in Church, and just

celebrated Burns' Night with a ceilidh in the Village Hall, plans are afoot for the Easter Services, as Easter is earlyish this year. Easter depends on the date of the full moon. Easter Sunday is (since 325 A.D.) the Sunday following the first full moon on or after March 21 st . So Easter can fall from March 22 to April 25. This year Easter Sunday is of course on 31st March, which, incidentally, is also the start of British Summer Time.

At the time of writing, the churchyard is full of snowdrops about to burst into full flower, the sun is shining, and the birds are singing: a lovely day for a walk in the park.

Neighbourhood Watch

A reminder from the Neighbourhood Watch team.

As spring approaches you may consider renovations and maintenance projects, including rooftop repairs and upgrades. When having work done on your roof, you should keep the following in mind:

It is possible that a minor repair is all that is needed. If someone suggests you should have your whole roof replaced always get a second opinion and a written quote.

Be wary of seeking quotes via the internet, you open yourself up to being contacted by anyone - both

reputable and fraudulent. It is better to ask friends and neighbours, who had work done in the past, for recommendations.

If you are elderly and are in any doubt about work that is being offered, ask your adult children, friends or neighbours for advice before agreeing to expensive work being carried out on your property.

Any fraudulent activity from gross overcharging or doing work that doesn't need doing, should be reported to the police on 101 and to Trading Standards on 0808 223 1133

late Spring (date to be confirmed on Facebook).



Thank You Mr Freeman

Many of you in the three Valley villages will be aware of the retirement of Mr Graham Freeman; he has delivered our newspapers for the past 20 years. You are probably less aware of the history of the newsagent M H Freeman and Sons.

Graham's father was a bookmaker in Desborough Road in the 1960's. At that time Graham was a paperboy at one of the newsagents along Desborough Road. It so happened that the newsagents where Graham had worked for 3 years came up for sale. Mr Freeman Senior saw the opportunity and in 1966, at the grand age of 16 years, his son Graham was in charge, alongside his mother, with his brother joining some time later.

At that time there were five other newsagents along Desborough Road, competition was always present. The business involved hard graft and some fortunate breaks along the way. One of these fortunate events was the acquisition of the newspaper delivery to Wycombe Hospital.

M H Freeman and Sons always remained a traditional newsagent, a place where locals purchased their daily paper and had a quick chat on their way to work at the small furniture factories which still occupied that side of town.

The day started at 3.10 am with a trip to Slough to collect that day's papers followed by marking up and delivery. In those early days one could expect Christmas, Good Friday, Easter Sunday and the Bank Holidays off. However, the arrival of the Today newspaper group in the 1980's and the accompanying changes in newspaper production put an end to so much time off! From that point all but Christmas Day were delivery days! But Graham maintains that this is now all part of the job, one has got to give customers the service they expect. Asked about the rigours of the work, the long hours, the unpredictability of the weather, Graham still maintains he had:

"The best job in the world"

In 2003 another of those "opportunities" came up. As the contract to deliver to Wycombe hospital came to an end MH Freeman and Sons were able to purchase the paper round that now covers our three villages. Graham and his wife Janice have lived in Hughenden Valley since 1978 and brought up their son and daughter in the valley. He knew the area well, so yet again a perfect marriage of opportunity and hard work.

The next turning point was of course the Pandemic. As "conveying the

news" was deemed an essential occupation, newspaper deliveries continued across the country. As well as his existing door to door delivery during this period Mr Freeman also ensured continued delivery for the customers of Hughenden Valley Community shop. A spokesperson commented that Mr Freeman had been "extremely helpful and supportive of the shop since it opened in 2009".

Post Pandemic much has changed. Work patterns have changed; younger generations get their daily news updated on line or not at all!

The shop on Desborough Road has now closed but the firm of MH Freeman and Sons proudly continues. Its remit covers a radius of about 9 miles, taking in Bradenham,

Loudwater, Stokenchurch, Speen and part of Marlow.

The future of the firm is in safe hands. Graham's nephew Ben Freeman is taking over the business so the on-going local service is assured. Graham has not quite given up the pleasure of the best job in the world yet and can still be seen delivering the news as does his daughter Karen.

Asked what he looks forward to in retirement Mr Freeman said "time and maybe some fishing".

Appointment of a Proxy - Informative

Members are entitled to appoint a proxy to exercise all or any of their rights to attend, speak and vote at the AGM. A proxy need not be a member of the Association but must attend the AGM to represent the member. To be validly appointed, a proxy must be appointed using the procedure set out in these notes. If members wish their proxy to speak on their behalf at the meeting, members will need to appoint their own choice of proxy (not the Chairman of the AGM) and give their instructions directly to him/her. The Association strongly encourages members who might be in doubt of attending or do not wish to speak at the AGM to appoint the Chairman of the AGM as their proxy and submit any questions they might have in advance.

A member may instruct their proxy to abstain from voting on any of the Resolutions to be considered at the meeting. It should be noted that an abstention is not a vote in itself and will not be counted in the calculation of the proportional votes for and against the relevant Resolution. The appointment of a proxy will not

prevent a member from attending the AGM and voting in person. A member who has instructed the Chairman to vote on their behalf may change that instruction at any time up to the AGM or may attend themselves and speak and vote accordingly.

APPOINTMENT OF A PROXY USING A PROXY FORM

A Proxy Form for use in connection with the AGM is attached to the Notice with an Agenda. To be valid, any Proxy Form appointing a proxy must be received by the Secretary by no later than 48 hours (excluding non-working days) before the time of the AGM or any adjournment of that meeting. NOTE: A Proxy Vote is not included in the number required to achieve a Quorum.

Hughenden Primary School Eco news at HPS

Here at HPS we have been trying to go greener. No, we haven't painted the school green, well not yet. The Eco council, made up from children across key stage 2, want to create a better, more environmentally friendly school.

To this end we have been looking at ways to improve our outdoor spaces, looking closely at our paper usage (you may be shocked about how paper is used in schools), thinking about reducing the amount of traffic getting children to school and improving our recycling. With the help of the local Climate Group we managed to plant around 400 sapling bushes that will become a haven for all sorts of wildlife. We have raised beds for growing vegetables that the children will sow seeds, maintain and eventually taste the 'fruits' of their labour.

We are about to work with Buglife who will come in and help us create herb gardens and wildflower areas. We are making sure that everyone uses electricity wisely by turning off lights when rooms are out of use.

We will be carrying out a parent survey to see if we can either get more children to walk to school or get children to use our park and stride scheme. Sustainability is a national focus in schools so we have begun looking at where 'things' come from; can they be sourced more locally. Working with our school meal provider to ensure that food is sourced as locally as is practical. It is a long journey but we have made a start.

The Council held a very successful Christmas gathering at Church House on the 14th December. It was great to see so many people from the Community who are out there delivering services and support for local people throughout the year. We hope to repeat this on a yearly basis. It was particularly special as the 14th December 1894 was the day the council was formed by Coningsby Disraeli – and first met at Church House.

The Environment & Services
Committee has been catching up on some long-standing backlog issues, and setting the future agenda for the Parish. But let me begin by acknowledging a couple of areas where we have still not quite got on top of things. First, we have a strong



desire to address the long outstanding renovation of the playgrounds at Great Kingshill and Templewood. The Clerk is currently seeking proposals for a Project Manager to pick these projects up and provide continuity and professional project management. Second, on the sometimes vexed question of clearing, trimming or cutting verges, hedges and pavements, we need to provide better clarity as to when this is a Parish Council responsibility, and if it isn't, whose it is. We also need to tighten up our oversight of requests being made to our contractors compared to jobs being completed. Both playgrounds and the maintenance of hedges, verges and pavements affect the daily lives of many parishioners and we recognise that these are important things to get to grips with.

In terms of backlog issues, we have installed more secure electric gates at the Garden of Rest. As you may know we suffered a spate of thefts of the batteries out of our speed monitoring units. After many months of negotiation with suppliers and experimentation around different

ways of securing the units, thanks to the Road Safety working Group we finally have six back in action, with a seventh going up soon in Naphill. After a bit of drama, we now have the streetlights situation in a happier place. The Parish has adopted the streetlights, and thanks to the Streetlights Working Group, has carried out needed maintenance and has secured a reduced electricity contract, saving £1,600 per annum.

Looking ahead, the Council has approved an Open Spaces strategy. This relates to the approximately twenty plots of land controlled by the Council. The strategy is to develop an appropriate Site Management Plan for each site. Some sites, such as Little Burnham Meadow and Spinney and Vincents Meadow and Pond, have tremendous ecological heritage and future potential. Others, such as Cockshoot Wood, Primrose Hill and the Old Allotment on Common Road, have amenity value. So far, we have approved a site management plan for

Cockpit Hole, working with Chiltern Rangers, and are well on the way to implementing the plan, with the fantastic support of local community volunteers. We expect to present plans for Little Burnham Meadow and Spinney, Cockshoot Wood and Vincents Meadow and Pond to the Council for approval in January. The Plans have received a lot of invaluable input from interested local residents, for which we and our consultant, Mike Deegan, are immensely grateful. We hoping to receive plans for Hatches Field, Primrose Hill among others during the first half of next year. The strategy is to incorporate the ongoing management of these sites into our future Grounds Maintenance contracts, starting in the Spring of 2025.

A Trip to the Hospital!

We are all familiar with having to go to hospital and having an X-Ray scan taken to help a doctor to 'see' what has gone wrong inside us. X-rays are generated in noisy machines with many notices warning you to stand well away because they are very dangerous unless used very carefully by a well-protected operator working behind dark screens.

My doctor recently sent me for a bone scan. I was directed to the X-Ray department, and was ushered into a small brightly-lit room. I was asked to lie still on a couch (no need to change into a gown) while the scanner just glides silently over you. There was hardly any sound or sensation during the scan.

I was expecting an X-ray scan and I am used to that. But if they were not using x-rays they had to be using something else. That just had to be gamma rays. I was bursting to ask "Where do you get these rays from?" because I know that the only place you would expect to find lots of gamma rays is in some astronomical event in a galaxy in deep space. The answer was from a little device about the size of a microwave cooker called an Amertec Technetium Generator, and the operator was happy to explain how it worked and even lent me their operating book for just a

couple of days.

In the 1950s, when I was coming up to A Level exams I picked up and read a Postgraduate booklet on radioactivity and X-ray analysis by Prof Sir W. Lawrence Bragg and Dr H. J. Emeleus. I found it fascinating and easy to understand the periodic table and how radioactive elements mutated as they give off radiation. A lot more has been learned about it since then! The Periodic table is the triangular diagram which sets out all the then 92 elements in ascending atomic weight sequence (leaving spaces in the pattern for elements they realised they had never yet been able to find).

So where can you get gamma rays from today that you can handle, to enable their safe use in a scanner?

"You start with Uranium 235" is the answer. You can obtain the isotopes of many different elements from Highly Enriched Uranium235 in an atomic reactor. One such element is Molybdenum (you may have heard of the name from a petrol head in connection with racing motorcycles) but it is an unusual element which occurs in numerous isotopic forms, some of which are radioactive. When they emit radiation they turn into isotopes of other elements.

Molybdenum 99 because of its very short radio-active half-life never gets to accumulate in rocks in nature. But when it disintegrates it forms Technetium 99 which neatly fitted one of the missing element spaces in the periodic sequence. Tc99m has a short half-life of 6 hours so it can be used medically without concerns about long-term radiation damage.

When it disintegrates it emits powerful gamma rays; the source at last! This makes it a very useful source of Gamma rays; it can be used safely for diagnostic medicine.

How was that for excitement for me?

Radioactive isotopes are used for a number of nuclear medicine diagnostic procedures. These include radio-imaging to detect carcinomas and tumours. A technetium generator extracts a radioactive isotope — in this case Technetium-99m (99mTc). This is used in diagnostic investigations. But as 99mTc has a half-life of only six hours, it has to be produced just before it is injected into a patient.

Hello Plotters.

The Weekend Away

It's quite sunny today, 22 January 2024, the recent cold snap has gone and yesterday's storm ("Isha") has blown through without apparent damage. It would seem that all is well with nature, at least locally. Food is abundant this year; the holly trees are laden with berries, as are the mature ivy, cotoneasters and many other shrubs. Gardens with feeder stations are also a great help for birds and provide us with lots of enjoyment.

By the way, it is not true that birds become solely reliant on feeders rather than hunting for seeds and worms etc from the garden: at any time of year birds will make use of feeders as a supplement to their foraged diet. Which seeds and berries are in season, whether the ground is soft enough to be able to dig for invertebrates or whether a usual feeding place is available (or not) all have a bearing on whether a particular species will visit a feeding station. So, if you provide feeders, please keep them stocked all year.

The same thing applies to small mammals, reptiles and even invertebrates. Those of us lucky enough to have visiting (or hibernating) hedgehogs in our gardens should think about putting out appropriate food and water during warmer spells in winter/early spring.

It also pays to be careful about tidying or digging the garden at this time of year ... please don't hit a hedgehog, snake, or newt with a spade as you turn the compost heap, leaf litter, cut logs or branches, piled in those inaccessible or forgotten corners of the garden, all of which provide shelter for all sorts of wildlife.

Notwithstanding the parade of heavy rain, sharp frosts, and storms (we will probably be beyond storms named with initials J and K, by the publication date of this article) my garden birds are clearly getting ready for better weather and the breeding season. Merle and Oberon are definitely back; though it's probably too early to say they are nesting, I think they are scoping out nest sites. The Robins that visit the feeders are a pair (given they are not trying to kill each other) and the Fifth Column Jackdaws are increasing in numbers...old hands apparently teaching new visitors (juveniles) how to hang on to the feeders and get the seeds/fat balls. The Great, Blue, and Long-Tail Tits have been joined by new but regular visitors: Coal Tits. They are few in number but are far

more frequent visitors than in previous years. The Wood Pigeons are here – they are making the most of the ivy berries, seemingly to the exclusion of anything else; but so far there is no sight of the Collared Doves: I hope they have not gone to pastures-new. Sadly, I cannot claim to have had any visits by Waxwings though much of the UK, including Holmer Green (!) has been graced with their presence.

Next weekend will be the Great Garden Bird Watch: I know from pastyears' bitter experience nearly all my usual birds take a long weekend away. They seem to want to skew the results in order to get the sympathy vote......and more food?

It's the quiet time for HAGA....no meeting until the end of February; but keep your eyes and ears open...our programme of talks and visits will be up and running for the coming season. We are pleased to say that our membership remains at a healthy level; we are still able to welcome visitors and (hopefully) new

members throughout the year. So, don't hesitate to come along to any of our meetings; you will be welcome. As a visitor you still get the free cup of tea and a biscuit extravaganza, just like a member!

HAGA members continue to benefit from discounts offered by Dobies Seeds, Hildreth's Garden Centre, Peterlee Farm (Garden Centre), and Huws Gray builders' merchant. Specific details are available separately to members.

PS. Stop Press, early February.

No Waxwings at all but on 30 January the garden was visited by three Redwings and two Fieldfares. Hoorah!! They stayed for three days until they had stripped the ivy berries bare. The Gold Finches are here in numbers and we even had a visit by a Green Woodpecker. Of course, they all waited until after the Bird Watch weekend...... told you so!!

Local Wildlife Site THE CONSERVATION GROUP

February 2024 report

It is currently better-than-average weather for early February but there are warnings that we are in for a cold snap, even a "Snow Bomb", before long. So, enjoy what we've got while we can!

The Conservation Group are having a generally enjoyable time of it we are doing two sessions a week now in order to make up for lost time during autumn/early winter. Too much rain played its part, of course, but that was over and above the delay to the mowing/hay clearance owing to the unfortunate breakdown of our contractor's baler. Better late than never, so they say, and a cut was achieved before Christmas.

Although time was lost due to very wet ground, we were able to undertake some necessary tree management. In the autumn we felled the last-remaining, non-native conifer on the top (western boundary) of the banking. A very large specimen which was not only out of place (as a "foreign" import from some years ago) but offered little to the grassland environment — there is very little invertebrate life in a fir tree, few birds nest or shelter in

them and there is nothing much attractive for small mammals. A conifer is nearly a desert environment when compared to a native oak which supports well over 2000 species of plants, fungi, invertebrates, mammals, and birds. In recent weeks we have coppiced several hawthorns, blackthorns and one wild cherry. Their reduction will allow more light into the under-story for wildflowers, allows for clearance of shrub and creates shelters for more wildlife, while the coppicing itself ultimately rejuvenates the cut trees. We shall keep on with coppicing and pollarding for a few weeks yet, while sap is still low, in order to open up further spaces.

We believe the Twayblade Orchid is in growth already, in its usual place. We are hoping to give it a little more protection from marauding slugs this year: a liberal sprinkling of coffee grounds around the plants will hopefully deter the slugs (without, of course, resorting to poisonous pellets).

Other deterrent measures on the upcoming plan are clearance of Common Dogwood (Cornus Sanquinea); Hypericum (St John's Wort) and, later, Rose Bay Willow



Herb (Fire Weed). The Dogwood, though the common native species, is an invasive plant in our environment and its suckering, matting, root systems plus rapid upward growth ensures that it out-competes our other wildflowers. Ideally, we should dig out the roots – but a long, back aching, process - or more usually we must, at the very least, strim down the early spring growth in an attempt to weaken the plants over time. That way we do at least give the orchids a chance to get through and flower. Hypericum is equally invasive if left to its own devices and therefore similar action is called for.... again, in early spring. Like the non-native conifer, we believe its appearance on the banking is the result of someone's misguided planting from their garden. Rose Bay Willow Herb is non-native and

invasive. We try to take it all down before it sets seed in summertime; at least it is easier to pull than dogwood!!

Most people will have noticed as they move around the Valley and local areas that this winter has seen a profusion of Holly and Ivy berries on the trees. Whether or not they are a harbinger of a hard winter they are a welcome source of high energy food for many birds. The crop doesn't last long though; once discovered the birds make the best of it. This year has seen many Redwings and Fieldfares as well as usual suspects (the resident Robins, Dunnocks, Starlings, Blackbirds and Pigeons) and, though perhaps not on the Banking, there have been a number of sightings of Waxwings in the

locality. Not unusual, but worth noting, is the presence down at the river by the water-pumping station of a Grey Heron. If bird watching is your thing, the Banking is an ideal environment in which to indulge your interest: the grassland and the mixed wooded areas offer an essentially calm space, in which to see a variety of birds at any time of year. Lepidopterists and botanists can also enjoy this place: our wildflowers, grasses and trees support myriad insects, butterflies, and moths, and many of our plants and flowers are special, even rare, in themselves.

Please feel free to visit this rare and historically important environment which is part of the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) and is one of the Chilterns' jewels. At any time of year there will be something to see or hear. It is a varied and beautiful place and we are sure you would be surprised by its changing face throughout the seasons.

Just come along, bring a smile, open eyes, and a light tread. And enjoy!



- * Buckinghamshire Council is seeking residents' views on governance arrangements for High Wycombe. Residents can respond to the survey to tell the council if they would prefer to keep arrangements in High Wycombe as they are, or whether a town council should be created. The consultation is open until 11.59pm on Sunday 7 April 2024 and can also be accessed online at Your Voice Bucks.
- Communities should prepare for groundwater flooding. Residents can check their risk on the government website https://www.gov.uk/ guidance/groundwater-flooding. **Buckinghamshire Council have** produced groundwater flood maps of the likely locations for groundwater flooding, where it is most likely to emerge and what locations it will impact. These are available for Chesham, Marlow, Hambleden, Wycombe and West Wycombe. If you are experiencing flooding, you can call Floodline for advice at 0345 9881188. You should report flooding to Buckinghamshire Council. Groundwater can infiltrate the sewage system. If you have problems flushing your toilet or sewage is

emerging, contact Thames Water on 0800 316 9800.

Buckinghamshire Council sets budget for next three years. https:// www.buckinghamshire.gov.uk/news/ buckinghamshire-council-setsbudget-for-next-three-years/ Councillors in Buckinghamshire have approved the council's Medium Term Financial Plan, which sets out its spending plans and how these are budgeted for over the next three years. The costs of providing some of these services have also risen well above already high inflation rates, for example, a 20-30% increase in road construction and repairs costs. With council tax funding 80% of the council's net operating budget needed to pay for these services, councillors have agreed to raise the base rate of council tax by 2.99% with a further 2% increase in the adult social care precept. This means an overall rise of 4.99% in council tax bills, or an extra £1.69 per week for the average Band D household.

Councillors agreed to make an extra £5 million from Reserves available directly to address the deterioration of local roads caused by the severe weather conditions in recent weeks. It means a total of £110 million is now set aside for roads repairs and improvements over the next four years.
